#### **BIOGRAPHIES**



**KATHERINE EBERLE** is a versatile mezzo-soprano soloist. Concert credits include solo performances with the symphonies of Detroit, Lansing, and Saginaw and Atlanta, Macon, Rome, and Valdosta. She has given over one hundred solo recitals as a guest artist in eighteen states as well as in Brazil, the Netherlands, Russia, St. John and St. Thomas, Virgin Islands. She made her New York debut at Weill Recital Hall, Carnegie Hall in 1994. She was an Artistic Ambassador for the United States Information Agency doing solo concert tours in South America (in 1995 she appeared in Argentina, Ecuador, Peru, Trinidad, and Tobago) and in Korea in 1997. Eberle's recording *From a Woman's Perspective* was released by the Vienna Modern Masters label. Eberle earned degrees from Baldwin-Wallace Conservatory (B.M.E), the University of Cincinnati (M.M.), and the University of Michigan (D.M.A). She has taught at The University of Iowa since 1990.



GREGORY HAND is in his first year as assistant professor of Organ at The University of Iowa. Prior to this he acted as university chapel organist at Northwestern University, where he also taught in the Music Theory department. He holds the Doctorate of Musical Arts degree from the University of Michigan, studying with James Kibbie. Dr. Hand has participated in several international organ competitions, including the Grand Prix de Chartres (France), St. Albans (England), Prix André Marchal (France), and the Dublin International Organ Competition. He is also active as a harpsichordist and continuo player. Recent engagements include Giulio Cesare with Lyric Opera of Chicago, and Ritorno d'Ulisse with Chicago Opera Theater.



**DAVID PUDERBAUGH** is assistant director of Choral Activities at The University of Iowa, where he conducts Camerata, teaches graduate choral literature and undergraduate choral conducting, and assists in administration of the choral program. A native Iowan, Dr. Puderbaugh holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Drake University (Des Moines, Iowa), a Master of Music degree in Choral Conducting from the University of Missouri-Columbia, and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Choral Conducting and Pedagogy from The University of Iowa. His teachers include Timothy Stalter, David Rayl, and Aimee Beckmann-Collier. Dr. Puderbaugh is also music director of Chamber Singers of Iowa City, an ensemble that focuses on choral/orchestral repertory, having recently performed Beethoven's *Mass in C Major*, Handel's *Messiah*, Haydn's *The Creation*, and Orff's *Carmina Burana*. Dr. Puderbaugh's current research interest centers on Estonian choral music, and he is interested in bringing the Baltic region's vast choral treasury to the United States through performance as well as the creation of performing and critical editions.
